The meeting will be 11 recorded, and a transcription will be provided at a later date. The public has the 12 13 opportunity to observe this meeting live 14 online and to submit comments pursuant to 15 instructions given on the village website and 16 in the meeting notice. 17 The Village Administrator will now call 18 the roll for attendance at this meeting by 19 members of the Village Board of Trustees and 20 relevant village staff. 21 Denise, please call the roll. 2.2 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Deputy 23 Mayor Sharkey. 24 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Here.

17	MAYOR WEINBERG: It is 7:35 p.m. I would
18	open the public hearing on Bill T2021G, a
19	local law to repeal Village of Thomaston
20	Local Law 3-2021.
21	The Nassau County Planning Commission has
22	not responded to this matter, and more than
23	30 days has passed. We may discuss Bill
24	T2021G. And we are going to open this up to

comments from the public.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Mayor, before
you do that, may I just note for the record
there are 47 participants signed in at this
point. This will change constantly as we go.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Sure.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: So just to let people know how this process works with the public hearing.

If anyone wishes to speak with respect to the proposed local law, they should use the "raised hand" feature on the bottom of the screen. On my screen it's on the bottom.

Several people have been asking about showing the video of all the people who are here. The webinar format does not permit that to be done. And the legal requirement is that everyone be able to see and observe the Board, which they can. So we're in compliance.

Apparently some people are having sound problems. I think it's their volume, because everyone else's seems to be working okay.

And so if anyone wishes to speak, they should

raise their hand. We will get to everybody 1 in turn. People who are on the phone can 2 3 raise their hand by pressing \*9. We have three people who have raised 4 5 hands so far. Let me just see who they are. VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: We have 6 7 Robert Martin, Wenjie Chen, Eric Freeman and 8 Wendy Halpern. 9 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes. 10 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I will 11 allow Mr. Martin to speak first. I'm just 12 going from the top down at this point. 13 DR. MARTIN: Thank you. I cannot hear 14 anything that's being said. I heard you say 15 that I could speak, but after that everything 16 that's been said heretofore has been muffled 17 and very quiet. 18 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Mr. Martin, I 19 don't know what the reason is for that, 20 because everyone else seems to be heard all right. And all board members can be heard 21 22 clearly. And I assume they're hearing me. 23 MAYOR WEINBERG: Denise, is it possible 24 that Mr. Martin can call in via the phone and

DR. MARTIN: Computer on mute. 1 2 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: -- and talk into 3 the phone. So we can hear you. You can go ahead when you're ready. 4 5 MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sorry. May I 6 interrupt, Tom, before Mr. Martin begins? I 7 apologize. 8 Just so everyone knows, a petition was 9 received at village hall. And I believe -- I 10 believe -- what time was that received, 11 Denise? About four o'clock? 12 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Just a 13 few minutes before four o'clock. 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: And that petition, there 15 was a request it be made part of the hearing 16 record. And the petition will be made part 17 of the hearing record, and was when it was 18 received, distributed to the Board of 19 Trustees. So I just want everyone to know 20 that. 21 When everyone make their comments, if 22 they would give their name, their address. 23 And if they could please be brief, it would 24 give everyone an opportunity to be heard who

wishes to be heard. Thank you. 1 2 Mr. Martin, please go ahead. 3 DR. MARTIN: Oh, Jesus. Can you start with somebody else? 4 5 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Mr. Martin, if 6 you speak we can hear you. Mr. Martin, your 7 phone seems to be disconnected from the tone. 8 MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Martin, if you can 9 hear us, would you please call back in. And 10 we will proceed with somebody else who wishes 11 to speak and we will come back to you. We 12 will come back to you as soon as you come 13 back in. 14 Okay. Denise or Tom, please call the 15 next person. 16 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I see 17 Wenjie Chen has a hand up. 18 MS. CHEN: Yeah. This is Wenjie Chen. 19 This is Wenjie Chen. I living 130 S. Middle 20 Neck Road, which is right next door to the 21 Tower Ford site. 22 So first I want to talk about the notice 23 of the rezoning law. When it was passed I 24 didn't receive the notice. But in the last 6

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months I received a notice about a solar panel installations for a neighbor's house which I couldn't see from where I live. But this like — this rezoning law applies to the site which right next door. And I didn't receive any notice about this site rezoning law.

Apparently that meeting we pass a law, there was only one public attendance. That one public attendance had no questions. Four board member have no questions. And so that was passed, right? So very few questions were passed over there.

And also that rezoning law was solely drafted by the developer, right? And I don't see any, you know, edits from the village or something or discussions about the -- whether there's any edits about this. So I will be very brief. And this is, like, my point right now.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Ms. Chen, this is a hearing on a proposed law to repeal Local Law 3. Do you have any comments on the repeal of Local Law 3?

1	MS. CHEN: Could you say it?
2	MAYOR WEINBERG: This is a hearing to
3	repeal Local Law 3-2021.
4	TRUSTEE WESTON: Incentive use.
5	MAYOR WEINBERG: That's the local law
6	that was drafted by the Village Attorney.
7	This again is a hearing to repeal that local
8	law.
9	MS. CHEN: Right. And this I was
10	giving you the reasons to repeal, right.
11	TRUSTEE WESTON: Okay.
12	MAYOR WEINBERG: Please. Please proceed.
13	MS. CHEN: I worded on that.
14	MAYOR WEINBERG: Oh, okay. Thank you.
15	Do we have okay. The next the next
16	person who wishes to speak.
17	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: We can
18	try Mr. Martin again. Mr. Martin, are you
19	there?
20	VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Mr. Martin, if
21	you're only on the computer you need to
22	unmute.
23	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
24	We'll move on then

1	MAYOR WEINBERG: Yup.
2	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: to
3	Linda Zhang.
4	Ms. Zhang, you can speak if you wish.
5	DR. MARTIN: I don't know if you can hear
6	or no.
7	VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Mr. Martin, we
8	can hear you, but we're getting an echo
9	again. You can't have your computer sound
10	and your phone sound on at the same time.
11	DR. MARTIN: I will turn
12	VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: You're doing
13	well on the computer. Okay. You want to
14	proceed, Mr. Martin?
15	DR. MARTIN: I don't
16	MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. If you can mute,
17	Mr. Martin. If and when you want to proceed,
18	stay on mute and please call in again.
19	Denise, please was Linda was it
20	Linda Zhang?
21	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Linda
22	Zhang. I don't see her hand up anymore.
23	MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. If you can go to

1	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
2	Next person is Eric Freeman.
3	MR. FREEMAN: Hello. Can you hear me?
4	MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes.
5	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Yes.
6	MR. FREEMAN: How are you doing? My name
7	is Eric Freeman. I'm a resident of Russell
8	Gardens for the past 7 years. I live very
9	close to Middle Neck Road.
10	I'm in opposition to this project that
11	you're planning on Middle Neck Road, 75
12	apartment buildings. I don't see any benefit
13	to it except adding more congestion to Middle
14	Neck Road, increasing taxes and flooding the
15	school system.
16	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you, Mr. Freeman.
17	The application has been withdrawn. This
18	is a hearing set to repeal the local law that
19	permitted the application. But that okay.
20	Thank you. Would you Mr. Freeman, would
21	you add your address, please?
22	MR. FREEMAN: Sure. 3 Darley Road.
23	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you very much.
24	MR. FREEMAN: No problem.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Who's next? 1 2 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay. 3 Next is Wendy Halpern. MS. HALPERN: Hello. Thanks for calling 4 5 on me. I obviously have a lot to say. Let 6 me be brief. I do have some preliminary 7 comments that I want to put on the record. 8 First I will say my name and address. My 9 name is Wendy Halpern. I live in the Village 10 of Thomaston. 10 Brompton Road. Great Neck, 11 New York 11021. I've been living in the 12 village for nearly 20 years. Before we had 13 this house, which we bought around 2007, I 14 actually lived at 37 Brompton Road right when 15 I graduated law school in 2002. 16 So I've been a member of this community 17 for nearly 20 years. And to be honest, until 18 August I really had no idea who any of you 19 were. Now I know. Before I get started in 20 my comments I just wanted to make some 21 initial thoughts about just the whole format. 22 So first I want to question why this is a 23 "webinar format." It would be nice to see, 24 especially in COVID, who else is on the call.

I know the village had other hearings and meetings where we were all able to see each other. So I'm not sure why this is different. You know, we -- if it wasn't for COVID we would all be in village hall seeing each other. And so I don't understand why you changed the format for this.

Second, I know that along the last 5 or so months the village has received many comments in opposition to these proceedings in letter format, e-mail format. And this is separate than the landmark proceeding request. So I request that those also be part of the record.

Since August when this hearing was first

-- when the initial hearing was noticed you
invited everybody to either attend the
meeting and/or comments. And I know many,
many people have submitted comments. And
those should be printed up and made part of
this record as well so all of the trustees
can see what has been submitted. I'm not
sure if that has been done.

I'm also surprised that before the

hearing -- before you opened up comments to the public, I'm surprised that no one from the village, including Mayor Weinberg, made any introductory comments about why we're even here. Why did he -- why did the village put us through 5 months of aggravation when we could have had a hearing just like this on August 16th when we all showed up in village hall? If you recall, that's when we all found out what's happening in the village because there was no proper notice.

Now, I know you're going to say we did give notice, but, you know, that wasn't practical. And I also want to mention that the notice that's given in The Great Neck News separate from the substantive comments, in this day and age The Great Neck News is not the proper form to give notice, okay. It has a readership of several hundred. And even if those people even live in the village, it's a microscopic font in the back. And in this day and age the village should reconsider how it gives its format notice.

We all, as you know, in August on

literally 5 or 6 days notice of some people in the neighborhood receiving the mailed out notices from the applicant we rallied the village. Now I know because I did listen to all the recordings that Mr. Pang luckily did. Because if it wasn't for those recordings, we wouldn't have known.

I know that some people were claiming that we were upset because we didn't get personal notice of it. That's not the issue. We didn't get any notice of it. For one of the largest projects that the Village of Thomaston or even in Great Neck in the history of this village was putting through to secretly pass that law when no one knew about it is totally unacceptable.

And I can maybe understand that -- your claim that you gave letter -- notice as required by law, because that's your position. Everything is in "compliance with law." But on August 16th probably 60 or 70 of your constituents showed up in village hall very upset, wanting to be heard, expressly stating to you that we had no

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knowledge that any of this was happening, okay. Rather than hear us, you adjourned the meeting to the Village of North Hills and told us to please leave the room.

I also want to clarify why we were so upset that the hearing was made to the Village of North Hills. Because I know there was discussion after we all left the room that the travel distance between Great Neck and the Village of North Hills is very similar to Great Neck and the other schools, okay. But the point is this is a Great Neck matter. And it should stay within our jurisdiction. And you don't just send people to another village to have a hearing. That's why we were so upset.

And I know that you we were all chatting that no matter what the village does people will be unhappy. I heard the entire conversation that happened when we left the room, that we were all -- I see Mr. Weinberg looks confused. But why don't you listen to the August 16th hearing recording when we all left and how you talked about the village

constituents behind our backs.

Totally acceptable. My blood was boiling when I heard how you were all laughing at us when we left. We were standing outside that room thinking that the meeting was over. And I know Denise had even asked you, is it okay to continue? And you all said, sure, why not? And Denise even said, you know they're going to claim we had this meeting in secret. And you all said it doesn't matter. No matter what we do no one will be — they will always be upset. You proceeded to go on with that meeting when we were standing outside wondering what was happening.

And at that meeting you elected -- you appointed two of your old friends to be on the village -- on the Landmark Commission.

That's totally unacceptable. For 4 or 5 months we've demanded to be heard, okay. If you really cared about what this village says, you would have said, you know what, let me hear what they have to say. Let me bring in the applicant and let me ask them some questions in a public forum so they can

answer them.

You never did that. Rather you just postponed, postponed, postponed, requiring us, the residents, to do FOIL request after FOIL request, spending tens of thousands of dollars on your village attorney to review those requests, requiring other village residents to spend tens and tens of thousands of dollars to hire their own lawyer to sue this village to stand up for their rights.

And you know what those FOIL requests showed? It showed that Mr. Weinberg had communications with the applicant since April 2020, okay. Secret communications. Nobody knew about it, okay. Your own board members in June asked you, is this a generic law that applies to all of Thomaston, or is this a specific law that applies to one property? And what did you say? You said, this is a generic law that applies to any given property in all of Thomaston. Any applicant who wants to convert a commercial property to a residential property can apply here.

Not at one point did you ever tell

anybody that there were applications that you already agreed to. On June 9th there is an e-mail showing that you agreed to a building to destroy the Tower Ford, okay. You let your own board be misled. And then in July you passed a law and said the same thing again to them. You wouldn't even answer questions about what's the incentive? What's being applied here? What's going on? You said, that's new business. I will get to that in new business, okay.

As soon as the law was passed you said, well, we actually do have an application. It actually came earlier this day. Oh, what is that? That's for the Tower Ford property.

Oh, let's date it tomorrow so that it looks like it came in after the law was passed.

Little did you know that your own village clerk had stamped it earlier that day because it was physically dropped off.

So what did you all decide to do? You decided to say, let's mark it at 7:52 p.m. so it looks like it was filed after the law was passed, okay. Those are allegations. And

that's supported by documents and recordings.

Not one statement I am saying is not supported by a single -- by an e-mail or document that the village produced.

All this time we were requesting hearings after hearing asking us to be heard, okay.

And nothing happened until you finally decided to hire the consultant. And then we had the public hearing. And we all said to you, Mr. Mayor, why are you hiring a consultant now when we haven't even had a single hearing on the application? Why would you have a consultant review a building that hasn't even been vetted by you or anyone on paper, even though we knew that you already approved it? Why would you waste that money?

No. No. No. We have to have our consultant. Let's hire a consultant. And your own applicant didn't even want to pay for that consultant, okay. They withdrew their application because they said they're not ready because there's so much uncertainly with landmarking, this and that. And they finally withdrew the application.

And then what do you do? You finally hire -- then you finally plan the landmarking proceedings after they specifically said we'll wait to see the landmarking proceedings. So then you appoint -- you have the committee finally have their meeting on November 30th. And in 35 days you're going to set the -- decide the fate of that building, okay.

These are all substantiated allegations.

And you have never addressed a single one of them. And it's totally unacceptable. And you can see how upset we're getting. And you know what? You have hundreds and hundreds of constituents who feel the same way as me.

And not one time have you ever addressed anything.

And I know you will say, oh, this law, all it did is give somebody the ability to apply, it gives us flexibility, blah, blah, blah. But you know what? We don't want flexibility. We want process. And the process that the village has is the Zoning Board of Appeals, which incidentally opposes

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this application, okay. You didn't want to go to your own village Board of Appeals because they don't want this, okay.

I know because we did our own renovation. And we went for 2 years arguing with the Zoning Board of Appeals over 7 inches of a property when our neighbor didn't even oppose it. That is why you didn't want this applicant to have to go to the Zoning Board of Appeals, okay. We don't want you to have sole unfettered discretion over this law. And all of these conversations should have been happening in August. And it could have all -- all of this could have been avoided. Tens and tens of thousands of dollars, hundreds and hundreds of hours of work and aggravation could have been avoided if you just listened to your people.

So I don't understand how we got to this point when you could -- you claim you didn't know we were upset, or we were upset and you didn't care. So either way the argument fails. And I don't understand why you can't even address your constituents on this point.

That's all I have to say right now. And don't say thank you for your comment, next please.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Ms. Halpern, this is not a debate. Do not say things that are not true. Do not say things that you presume to know how I feel, how this board acted or what any other board would do. I have acted and cared solely for what is in the best interest of this village at all times. And every single member of the Board has acted this way.

I've addressed your comments in my statements. I am going to adopt them here. I am not going to repeat them and belabor this. You know very well that in August and especially before incentive, no such time has anyone ever said who cares what they think or it doesn't matter what they think. This entire application was subject to public comment and would always be subject to the public hearing process. And this board and myself personally will always act on behalf of the public.

We have listened to these false
allegations of bribes, agreements, attorneys
drafting laws that are false. The village
attorney drafted this law. Our notices are
on the village website. We have always cared
about what the village residents feel and
think. But there is a process that has to be
followed. And if at a public hearing the
overwhelming community outpouring of
objection would be against a development, as
I said in my statement, I cannot imagine a
situation where I or this board would vote
for such a development.

Clearly we are really not adversaries and enemies. Clearly we are working together.

Because any development that is ever proposed on this site will only be with the community input and will only be approved with the community input. That August meeting was adjourned because of COVID-19 and an overcrowded village hall in excess -- in excess of the Certificate of Occupancy.

The Village of North Hills is 2 miles from Great Neck South. We heard you and

listened to you and respect what every 1 2 resident said, that even though the Village 3 of North Hills can accommodate over 200 people, that we would not have the meeting at 4 5 the Village of North Hills because the 6 residents didn't want it at the Village of 7 North Hills. 8 Then we were scheduling it by webinar. 9 And then we were putting the process in place 10 by which if the application was going 11 forward, it would have to be with the full 12 backing and commitment of the applicant to 13 pay all expenses going forward. That did not 14 occur. It was withdrawn. 15 We heard every single letter and listened 16 and cared about every letter. And that's why 17 we proposed to repeal the local law which is 18 causing you to be upset. 19 MS. HALPERN: No. Excuse me, Mr. 20 Mayor --21 MAYOR WEINBERG: We're not having a 2.2 debate. This is -- you've had your say. 23 This is not the forum for a debate. 24 MS. HALPERN: Actions speak louder than

words.

MAYOR WEINBERG: And here is the repeal.

MS. HALPERN: The law is fired

(phonetic).

MAYOR WEINBERG: We're not hearing -we're not hearing a debate on this. We're
going to proceed with other comments unless,
Mr. Levin, there's anything else you wish to
add.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: No. The only thing I wish to add is the purpose of this hearing is to get comments on the repeal of Local Law 3. Everything else is irrelevant to this hearing. So if -- I assume Ms. Halpern is in favor of the repeal.

MS. HALPERN: Well, first of all, the law expired anyway. And, yes. I am in favor of the repeal. And I just want to implore that actions speak louder than words. So if this is how you care about us, that's pretty bad. And I don't even know what to say. All I know is everything I said it true in terms of the facts, the e-mail and everything. And I implore people to go to safewaynet.org

(phonetic) and look at the exhibits yourself. 1 Because this is not how caring is honestly. 2 3 If this is how you say you care about us, it's laughable. 4 5 MAYOR WEINBERG: The application has been withdrawn. And we have an action -- a 6 7 proposed law to repeal the local law. We 8 really want to work together. And we 9 certainly don't want people to be angry. 10 Thank you. 11 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Would you like 12 to try Mr. Martin again? We still have -- we 13 have a lot of raised hands now. Mr. Martin 14 has been waiting. 15 Mr. Martin, we're asking you to unmute. 16 Mr. Martin, you're still muted. All right. 17 I guess we should go on to someone else. 18 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Sara 19 Blumenstein has raised her hand. 20 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: Hi. Can you hear me? 21 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes. 2.2 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: Okay. Good. So I have 23 a question sort of direct to the issue of the 24 repeal of the law. And that is, if the

procedure that lead to the passing of the law 1 2 was not strictly followed, is that a basis 3 for repealing the law? And the reason I ask that is because it is regarding the notice. 4 I am -- my name is Sara Blumenstein. I 5 6 live at 37 Brompton. And I'm on the Board. 7 And I do not recall ever seeing any 8 notification for the meeting where the law 9 was passed. 10 Now, where can we -- from what I 11 understand, and please correct me if I'm 12 wrong, besides the notice in the paper, 13 you're expected to physically send some kind 14 of a notice to the people that live in a 15 certain area right around that will be 16 affected? Is that true? 17 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: No, ma'am. 18 not. 19 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: So what are you 20 required to do exactly then? 21 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: For a local law 22 the requirement is that the village publish 23 the notice in the newspaper, post the notice 24 at the village hall and put it on the village

website. 1 2 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: And you don't have to 3 note -- because when I had some zoning done --4 5 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: That is not a 6 local law. 7 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: I had to have a 8 variance done. I had to be notified. 9 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Ms. Blumenstein, 10 that's a variance. It's a different process. 11 It's not a local law. 12 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: Okay. Very good. 13 Thank you for clearing that up for me. 14 I'm sorry. Go ahead, Mayor. 15 MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sorry. 16 I just want to reiterate. As Tom said, 17 all notices are on the website along with all 18 meeting materials along with we certainly 19 added that now in addition 311 notices go out 20 to everyone informing them of a board 21 meeting. 22 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: Okay. And I know this 23 may sound a little bit -- well, it's 24 definitely off the topic. But I -- since Mr.

Levin is getting paid for this -- and thank 1 2 you very much for your service because I know 3 you've been a lawyer for the town for a long time. But I kind of find it -- I don't know. 4 5 I don't want to get emotional about it, but I just don't think that if we're paying you you 6 7 should get to advertise for free on our time 8 for your law firm. It kind of -- is that 9 okay with everybody? Because nobody else is 10 advertising. So I would appreciate if you 11 wouldn't, just as a citizen since I'm paying you for this time anyway. That's it. And I 12 13 really appreciate you having this meeting so 14 we can all express what we're thinking about. That's it. I'm done. 15 16 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Are you in favor 17 or opposed to the repeal of the law? 18 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: Well, I'm very opposed 19 to -- I am very for the repeal of this law 20 because I --21 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: That's fine. 2.2 MS. BLUMENSTEIN: I'm all backwards here. 23 Because I read through the entire thing. I 24 read through all the documents. And at the

very end it says, well, the Board can 1 2 basically do what they want. And that -- so 3 I am totally against that. Totally -- I want the law repealed. 4 5 Thank you. VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: That's what the 6 7 hearing is about tonight. 8 Thank you. 9 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay. 10 Move on to the next hand is Ronnie Krowne. MR. KROWNE: Can I be heard? 11 12 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes, you can. 13 MR. KROWNE: My name is Ronald Krowne. I 14 live at 14 Brompton Road in Great Neck, the 15 Village of Thomaston, 11020. My wife and I 16 have resided here with our children since 17 1992. 18 First and foremost to me personally, you 19 keep referring to Mr. Martin. He's lived in 20 this village about 50 years. He's Dr. Robert 21 Martin. He's not Mister. He's Dr. Robert 22 Martin. And while he's muted right now, I'm 23 sure he's quite upset by the lack of respect

being given to him.

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I wish to personally -- yes. Certainly I 1 2 am in favor of the repeal of the law. While 3 I cannot speak as eloquently as Wendy Halpern who is my next-door neighbor, I echo all of 4 5 the sentiments that she has expressed with 6 the passion that she has expressed them. She 7 has been on top of this. And I would just 8 say that I am in standing behind her in 9 everything she has said and the passion. 10 There is a great amount of distrust that 11 your constituents have experienced. And I 12 don't -- won't get into it because it's just 13 -- it's fruitless. But I express the same 14 sentiment concerning the distress that we as 15 residents have towards the workings of the 16 village. I also -- I am in agreement with 17 the last respondee concerning the 18 advertisement of the village attorney over 19 his shoulder. 20 Thank you. I've said what I needed to 21 say. Thank you very much. 2.2 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: 23 Nancy Sherman. 24 MS. SHERMAN: Good evening. Hi. My name

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is Nancy Sherman. I also live in Thomaston.

I live at 92 Knightsbridge Road. And I've
been a resident of this village for many
years. I have to say that first of all, this
law has already expired by virtue of its
terms. And so yes, of course I am in favor
of the repeal of the law.

I am very disturbed as to how this law went into effect. No. 1, I support Wendy Fiel (phonetic) in all of the statements she made on the record. And, Mr. Weinberg, I will say that everything that Wendy said is supported by the evidence. It is supported by the recordings that you made, okay, the statements that you made on the recordings that are now in the possession of the village and which of course we understand the village did not want Mr. Pang to turn over to you because then you would have to turn it over to the public. But once these were made part of the lawsuit then of course the village was aware of it. And it was also sent to the village. And then the village had to provide it in a FOIL response.

So I also want to say, Mr. Weinberg, that there are no accusations or allegations against anything the Board has done. These allegations are against what you have done. We have not said that the Board was negotiating with the developer for a year and a half before. It was you, Mr. Stein — whatever your name is — Weinberg. It was you that was negotiating with the developer for a year and a half.

And don't deny it. Because the documents that the village provided by its FOIL response show it. It does not show that any of the Board members knew anything that was going on. It was you, Mr. Weinberg, who was involved in this. And I am not accusing the Board members of anything, okay. It was you.

And what's really concerning to me, Mr. Weinberg, is the fact that on tape on July 12th of this year when you decided to approve — to have your board vote on this law, this incentive use law, when you decided to have them vote on it you said, I'm going to tell you who the applicant is after you voted on

the law, okay, and as soon as they vote,
because you said it wasn't with respect to
any particular applicant. That's what you
had specifically stated, which is the
transcript that -- of the village
specifically states that this was not with
respect to any particular applicant. This
was only -- this law applied to any
commercial property anywhere in the Village
of Thomaston. Quote, end quote. Okay.

Now, what's very disturbing is that on

July 12th after the -- your board voted to

pass this law because nobody from the public

was present because nobody knew about it, you

said, oh -- I think you said this to Denise.

Did we receive an application? You said

well, "we will stamp it tomorrow." And then

Denise responded, Cathy already stamped it.

And then you, the mayor, you authorized this.

You -- you authorized Denise to write the time that this application was received at 7:52 p.m. That was a lie. You intentionally instructed Denise to say that the application was received at 7:52 p.m. when it was not

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filed at 7:52 p.m. That lie then became an official record of the Village of Thomaston, which is false. So now you have a false record of the Village of Thomaston which you asked your board to vote on those minutes, okay. So now we have false information in the Village of Thomaston.

And I question what else has gone on at your request in this village before Mr. Pang started to record these meetings. There had to be a reason for him to start recording these meetings. He started to record them, and now we know what goes on behind closed doors, which is extraordinarily concerning not only to me but to members of the public who have also heard these recordings. So you can respond to me and you can say I deny it, that's false, blah, blah, blah, blah. It's not false. It's your voice making these false statements. I'm shocked that as an attorney you would do such a thing.

Now, I also want to address something else, okay. I want this village to know and I want everybody on this Zoom to know and to

be part of the record that the petition was signed by over 740 people. Yes, that petition was received by the village and it made it sound like it was no big deal. Over 740 people signed that petition against Tower Ford. And guess what? They also signed it in favor of landmarking the Tower Ford building, okay.

What is also disturbing is what we heard on that other tape recording of August 16th of this year where you appointed people who have already sat on the Board, Mr. Don Levin (sic) and also a Gary Noren. You appointed them to sit on that Landmark Commission.

Well, we understand that you have the right to appoint them, but they have absolutely no background in history, in architecture or anything that has any relevance. It also now makes the public very, very suspect as to the reasons why you would appoint these people who have absolutely no background in history or in architecture or in preservation.

Yes, we know you can appoint anyone you

want. And you can also appoint your friends, which obviously you did, okay. But what is more concerning is that you told the public to leave the room. "Leave the room." We were not told that you were going to continue to have a meeting at this point, and that at that meeting you were then going to appoint two additional people to the Landmark Commission. Because that was not on the agenda, okay.

So not only was that not on the agenda, but you told the public, all 60 to 70 of us, to leave the room so that you could then go have more secret meetings. And yes, there was a comment by Denise at that time that the public was going to be upset that they were not in the meeting.

And, Mr. Levin, as the village attorney, you knew that we were standing outside. And it was your job as the village attorney to tell the Mayor and to tell the Board that they should go outside and somebody should go outside and let us know that you were going to be conducting a Board of Trustees meeting

that we were told to leave.

And I am telling you, Mr. Levin, it is very disturbing that you are on the village payroll. And I think that's another issue that should be brought up as to whether your contract should be renewed. Frankly it is very disturbing, all of these actions by the Mayor and by Mr. Levin, and frankly by Denise in going along with whatever the Mayor told her to do. I am not making any accusations against any other members of the Board here.

So that's all that I have to say. And, yes, I am in favor of the repeal. And, Mayor, I think you should step down from your position. Thank you.

MAYOR WEINBERG: I want to be very, very clear again.

As was stated in the statement, there was no agreement with the developer for any part of this project that would occur or could occur. The Mayor has no authority to enter into such an agreement. It can be a local law to be considered for incentive use zoning, the benefits of which were laid out

in a statement. It would always be subject 1 2 to public hearing if the applicant wanted to 3 proceed with the application. MS. SHERMAN: Please don't lie to us, 4 5 okay. We are a group of --MAYOR WEINBERG: It is not a debate. You 6 7 cast dispersions. You can cast dispersions 8 and you can impute what you -- what your --9 you can impute falsehoods. 10 MS. SHERMAN: I'm saying what I heard. 11 MAYOR WEINBERG: But you were also told 12 that the meeting would proceed but it would 13 not deal with the application. 14 MS. SHERMAN: What are you talking about? 15 MAYOR WEINBERG: And the village attorney 16 was present as well. 17 MS. SHERMAN: What are you talking about? 18 What meeting was going to proceed? 19 MAYOR WEINBERG: The applicant would only 20 -- if they went forward there would be a 21 public hearing and the public would be heard 2.2 on it. And that's the only way for the 23 application to be reviewed. 24 MS. SHERMAN: No. No. No. You're

1 wrong. We were --2 MAYOR WEINBERG: You want this repealed? 3 This is the law to repeal it. MS. SHERMAN: Don't tell -- you know, you 4 5 are dealing with a group of intelligent people in this community. You are not 6 7 dealing with stupid uneducated people. Many 8 of the people in this village are 9 professionals and well educated. So to think 10 that you can pull the wool over our eyes, to 11 think that you can say that we knew that 12 meeting was going on is false. We were told 13 to leave the room. 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: I don't --15 MS. SHERMAN: You have not read --16 MAYOR WEINBERG: We're not pulling the 17 wool over your eyes. And we certainly are 18 listening and want to proceed to repeal this 19 law. 20 MS. SHERMAN: Again -- again you are 21 interrupting me. 2.2 I am saying that we have read the 23 transcripts and we have listened to the

tapes. And they are abundantly clear as to

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everything you were doing, okay. And you gave the Board full and unfettered discretion to approve the incentive use law. And had a lawsuit not been commenced and had people not protested this and had not requested landmark status for that building, we would not be having this hearing today.

I rest -- I have nothing further to say.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Thank you.

TRUSTEE PANG: I'm sorry. Can I make a comment too? I just want to share with you something I learned recently.

So for the incentive zoning law that we passed in July, the zoning law itself could not have addressed -- do not have a section, block number, section number. I am kind of not happy about it because it did not tell me which lot is, you know, this law decides to give the incentive to.

But recently I had a conversation with Mr. Levin, the village attorney. He clarified that to me. An incentive zoning law cannot be decide to a specific law, otherwise it would be kind of what they call

a "spot zoning." It's not allowed by law.

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So I think the law itself is not allowed to be written in such a way to -specifically designed to benefit one specific lot. But that's -- the legal requirement aspect of it, meaning the village, certainly complied with the law in that sense because it -- the law does not allow that the incentive zoning law is for one specific lot.

So the law itself is following the letter of the law. It is not I would say intentionally hide the law -- hide the incentive zoning law. But I think in that case followed the law. That's good. But I think there's a legal component of that law. But I think that should be -- a complication component of it is try to tell, you know, everyone that, you know, what is the law -- what is the law supposed to have impact on I think.

So in that case I think when the Mayor said, no, this law is not for a specific project, a specific law, I think he answered correctly. But I just wish, you know,

there's more component -- a communication 1 2 component of that aspect so that this not 3 causing so much anger from the resident. Because it's a lose/lose situation from what 4 5 I can see right now. The village is losing it's repetition -- reputation and paying for 6 7 the lawyers's fee. And the rest of it is 8 very angry. I think it's a lose/lose 9 situation. 10 But I think now today we are repealing 11 this law. Let's move on, move forward with 12 I think the village learned a lesson 13 from this process. And we will keep the 14 communication clear in the future. That's 15 all that I have to say. MAYOR WEINBERG: I agree with you 100 16 17 percent. Thank you. 18 Next person, please. 19 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: 20 Zysman has been waiting to talk. 21 Ms. Zysman, are you there? 2.2 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Ms. Zysman, you 23 need to unmute. 24 MS. ZYSMAN: I'm sorry. Can you hear me?

1	VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes.
2	MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes.
3	MS. ZYSMAN: Okay. I am in favor of
4	repealing the law. And all that Wendy and
5	Nancy have produced to you, we've all had
6	proof of exactly what they're saying. And
7	we're all very, very upset about this. And
8	we need to repeal this law.
9	Thank you.
10	MAYOR WEINBERG: Next, please.
11	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
12	Ellen Mones has been waiting.
13	MS. MONES: I just want to say I'm all
14	for repealing the law, and as fast as
15	possible. And I hope we never have to go
16	through this again. It was unbelievable.
17	Thank you.
18	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Alka is
19	asking to speak.
20	MS. JAIN: Hello. Can you hear me?
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes, we can.
22	MS. JAIN: Hello, good evening. This is
23	Alka Jain. I'm a resident of 23 Brompton
24	Road. I have a couple of points.

Firstly I would like to point out that I sent an e-mail this evening with a petition.

And I would like to have the opportunity, as I promised everyone, to read out the comments from that petition so that those people's voices can be recorded as part of the record since no one has called to acknowledge that petition really.

Second point -- and that will take about 5 minutes, but I feel that it's necessary since you guys did not have a proper public hearing for the law when it was still active. And when we walked the streets of this village and gathered almost 900 signatures, of which you received 746, and there is a still another 150 peoples' copies outstanding.

Given that there's only 800 households in Thomaston roughly and we've got 900 signatures, that should give you an idea of the sheer anger and frustration. And as Trustee Pang has just pointed out that he feels that the law wasn't written for one property, I would like any of you right now

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to tell me what other property did that law apply to in Thomaston?

Name me one other property that is located partially in Apartment B District partially within adjoining Residence R-10 District, it's compromised of a total area of 0.75 acres, not more than one acre, having a depth at its greatest point of at least 200 feet and street frontage on Middle Neck Road of at least 230 feet. The maximum permitted residential density for a property to be developed by this permit pursuant to section shall be subject to the determination by the Board of Trustees to not to exceed 84 units per acre.

Now, Mr. Levin and Mr. Weinberg, what other property in Thomaston qualifies for that wording, since you claim that that law was not written, as Trustee Pang has said, for just one property? You should be able to tell us since it is written in such extremely beautiful detail what else qualifies.

And then I want you to tell me what does it take for me to get an incentive permit for

my property. What am I going to have to do? 1 2 Am I going to have to wine and dine the Mayor 3 for a year, send e-mails with Happy Hanukkah for the whole year? What is it that it takes 4 for someone in this village to get an 5 6 incentive permit in the future? I would just 7 like to understand the process going forward. 8 But you need to clarify for the record, 9 since you claim that that law wasn't written 10 for one property alone, what other property? 11 Can anyone answer that question? I'm asking. 12 I'm waiting. Okay. So let the record state 13 that there's no other property that that law 14 applies to except for 124 S. Middle Neck 15 Road. And it was written specifically for 16 one property only, contrary to what was 17 explained to Trustee Pang. Okay. All right. 18 MAYOR WEINBERG: That is not a -- that is 19 not a fair statement. 20 MS. JAIN: No, it is. Okay then. 21 name a --2.2 MAYOR WEINBERG: It's not a matter of 23 naming one property. There are properties in both districts. And there are other 24

1	properties that can be combined to do that.
2	MS. JAIN: No. I'm sorry.
3	MAYOR WEINBERG: It's up to the owner or
4	owners to do that.
5	MS. JAIN: Name me a property of multiple
6	owners that you supposedly are now stating
7	MAYOR WEINBERG: I've given the answer.
8	MS. JAIN: that can do that.
9	MAYOR WEINBERG: I've given the answer as
10	I understand it.
11	MS. JAIN: Okay. So in other words the
12	answer is false.
13	MAYOR WEINBERG: No.
14	MS. JAIN: The record states that you are
15	now giving a false answer.
16	MAYOR WEINBERG: No. No.
17	MS. JAIN: Yes.
18	MAYOR WEINBERG: Also no one again
19	we're not going to misstate what an incentive
20	use is. An incentive use I go back to the
21	statement allows the village to provide
22	for certain benefits. No permit was given.
23	No permit was granted. The Mayor has no
24	authority to do that. It was whether or not

an application would be granted. It wasn't 1 2 granted here. It was withdrawn. No one was 3 wined and dined. No one received a dinner. No one received any benefit whatsoever. 4 5 MS. JAIN: But you knew -- but you wrote 6 the law that you were expecting only one 7 property to apply. Is that not correct? 8 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is not a debate. 9 MS. JAIN: Is that not correct? 10 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is not a 11 domination. MS. JAIN: Is that not correct 12 13 MAYOR WEINBERG: Do you have something 14 else to question? It was an application that 15 would be considered by the public if we -- if 16 the applicant went forward with it. 17 MS. JAIN: No. Given a chance to 18 consider the application. We never got a 19 chance. 20 MAYOR WEINBERG: The applicant didn't 21 want to go forward with it. I believe with 22 Mr. Pang --23 MS. JAIN: We were described as "the 24 mob." The mob.

MAYOR WEINBERG: No, you're not. We --1 2 MS. JAIN: That's in the recording. 3 MAYOR WEINBERG: We're repealing this because we don't want the anger to continue. 4 5 MS. JAIN: Oh. No. No. You're 6 repealing this because the law expired, for 7 the record. Don't pull the wool over our 8 eyes, okay. You're repealing this because 9 the law expired this week. 10 MAYOR WEINBERG: The applicant withdrew 11 the application. There was nothing to go forward with it. 12 13 MS. JAIN: We have worked very, very hard 14 to oppose you on this and to cast you out. 15 And now I'm going to proceed to read out 16 every single comment that was written in the 17 petition to make sure that those voices are 18 on the record. 19 MAYOR WEINBERG: We can acknowledge it 20 would be annexed to the record. If this is 21 going to take 5 minutes, you may do so. 2.2 MS. JAIN: Okay. 23 Choi Yeung. No more apartment buildings 24 or houses. Instead bring back a supermarket

in the Great Neck Plaza or retail clothing stores or restaurants in that building. Look at Westfield town in New Jersey or Stanford. Everything is walking distance for those towns with a Target or supermarket nearby.

Jeffrey Fleit. This proposed project must not be approved, as it is extremely difficult to navigate in this already congested town. Furthermore, Great Neck does not have a decent supermarket. We need petitions from every cooperative building in Great Neck Plaza as well as Thomaston and Russell Gardens. Nice buses will have to detour onto private streets if this project is approved. Thank you.

Rhoda Berke-Kasner. As a relatively new resident of Great Neck, one of the things that was most rewarding to see was its historical preservation of buildings.

Knocking down the -- knocking down the old to replace it with new wipes out the character of a town.

Salvatore Vitale. I'm in agreement with this point. The proposed project will result

in substantial adverse change in traffic and 1 2 noise levels, parking, public transportation, 3 including Long Island Railroad overcrowding, public safety, population density and 4 5 property values in the neighborhood. Maurice Smon. Disgraceful behavior. 6 7 Yukki Yeung. How about more supermarkets 8 or restaurants or retail clothing stores? 9 Rita Landau. There is no parking 10 anywhere on Overlook Hillpark or Schenck. 11 Jennifer Liu. Schools will be 12 overcrowded with this eyesore. 13 Flavius Cosarca. Schools in the area are 14 already over capacity. School taxes have 15 gone up. We don't need more congestion. 16 What we need is a supermarket. 17 Ilana Benmayor. I like this landmark 18 building. It has given a lot of character to 19 our town. I would hate to see it go. 20 Joan Lazaunik. The overdevelopment of 21 the Great Neck peninsula benefits nobody. 2.2 Sharon Dobbs. I live across the street 23 from this proposed construction. Even though 24 my address is Great Neck Plaza, this will

have a direct impact on the residents of my building.

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Varda Solomon. Please do not allow any variances or waive any requirements. This defeats the purpose of our building code, which was developed to preserve the nature of the village and the ecosystem of our area. am particularly concerned about the request for excessive building coverage. When we wanted to replace our driveway, we were required to maintain water runoff on our property. Construction at the top of the hill must be held to the same standard to assure that sufficient land is available to contain water and snow melt. Under no circumstances should a builder be allowed to build more of the lot than the current building code allows. Likewise, building a taller building will create a larger shadow, reducing the sunlight in the area.

Maurice Simon. Very destructive to say the least.

Michael Tamarin. I have no objection to building housing units, but the existing

structure should be preserved with more than two stories of apartments built.

Philip Zimring. I spent a great deal of my formative years in and around Great Neck. The charm of many of the older structures cannot be reduplicated, and they should be allowed to stand for the cultural benefit of all citizens.

Tom Gavaris. Retired attorney and create a fund.

Mindy Alpert. I live down the block from the old Tower Ford building. There is already too much traffic, noise. This proposed building will negatively impact our quality of life.

Debbie Kaufman. I take care of a house in Thomaston. I do not support more development.

Helen Andres. This building is a historical landmark. This area is already congested with traffic and will create havoc through the Plaza, continuing to the Village of Great Neck. This project of apartments is just a developer's dream.

Martin Ingber. Residents of Thomaston 1 2 and Great Neck deserve a public opportunity 3 to review and evaluate this proposed development before it is allowed to proceed. 4 5 Laura Stone. I have lived in Great Neck most of my life. Losing another historic 6 7 building is sinful and we do not think we 8 need more expensive housing at the expense of 9 the history of Great Neck. 10 Lyda Zissimatos. I am furious. It is 11 ridiculous to build such a large complex 12 here. No one is even allowed to park on 13 Brompton Road more than an hour. How will 14 such a large complex work here? 15 Suzanne Mueller. I am a Great Neck Plaza 16 resident and pass this site frequently. We 17 don't need or want this proposed eyesore. 18 Schools are overcrowded. Roads are 19 jammed. Don't turn us into Queens. 20 David Pinsley. This proposed 21 constitution is an outrage and must be 2.2 stopped. 23 Roberta Moldawsky. It takes forever even 24 now to pull out of my 1 Overlook Avenue

building's driveway which is on S. Middle

Neck Road because of all the traffic. Now if

this horrendous building is constructed it

will create a traffic nightmare.

Philip and Aniko Burz. We totally agree with this petition.

Arlene Balaban. I love the area and the shops, but I hardly go there anymore because of the traffic. More congestion could have more of a negative effect on local businesses. Waiving all the usual steps is a bit suspicious. I am also opposed to destroying historic buildings.

Elizabeth H. I am against the overdevelopment of Long Island and building of high density housing. There's enough traffic. And the architecture design is ugly on the eyes. Whoever designed this got paid way too much.

Alvina Siu. Please stop the overcrowding in our neighborhood and school classrooms.

Bring in more retail spaces, supermarkets, restaurants, clothing stores, office buildings, hobby stores, etc.

Choi Y. Let's try and get a supermarket instead of more apartments. Why overcrowd our schools and space?

Jonathan Wagner. Great Neck already has more apartments than the town can already support. And even more apartments would increase that burden and as the petition suggests, adds to the traffic in the immediate and surrounding areas in ways that Great Neck cannot sustain.

Noel Angelo Toling. No to more traffic.

Dorit. Stop it with the apartment

buildings already. There's enough. Please
think about a supermarket. That's what we do

need.

Leslie Weinberg. Disgraceful, but fitting, considering how the rest of Great Neck is disintegrating.

Mandy Ohringer. Landmark designation for this site is essential to the future economic development of our town. Great Neck is the natural site for a "Museum of the American Jewish Suburban Experience." Maybe this location could be the proper site?

Laura Huhn. Please do not build up any rental property, hence overcrowding our schools.

Sharon Kohler. Please do not make any more apartments. This town was so charming and now it's turning into a mess. Traffic is a disaster already.

Tzipporah Gruy. Choking the neighborhood.

Pamela Sorani. This beautiful building should most definitely become a landmark in Great Neck.

Tracy Berlinsky. We do not need another apartment building in Great Neck. The population is overcrowding our school district. Please spend the money to help the local retail community instead.

Elizabeth Pinsky. We live across the street from this property. The traffic on Middle Neck Road is already excessive. This building proposal exhibits variances that are in contradiction to existing laws as well as the suburban nature of our community.

Sherry --

MAYOR WEINBERG: Alka, I'm sorry. I apologize for interrupting. This has been more than 5 minutes. The petition was distributed to each board member and is going to be made a part of the record. And the comments do not pertain to the issue before us tonight, which is whether to repeal the law.

MS. JAIN: Actually it does. It pertains to the comments in the sense that all of these people raised their voices and put their signatures on repealing the law that you are repealing tonight because you made the law in the first place. And you made it with very deceptive means. I don't care about the lies and accusations, but you have to admit that you wrote that law in very deceptive language. And no one else in this village would have qualified under that law.

And so shame on you and shame on Mr.

Levin for being part of it. And you should all resign. Mr. Levin and Mr. Mayor Weinberg should be the first to resign. And you should remove your appointees to the Landmark

Commission. 1 2 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Next speaker, 3 please. VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There is 4 5 a Nancy Solomon. MS. SOLOMON: Thank you very much. I am 6 7 not a resident of Thomaston. I have worked 8 as the village consultant of historic 9 preservation for the Village of Great Neck 10 Plaza, for the Village of Sea Cliff, for the 11 Village of Rockville Centre and other 12 communities on Long Island. 13 Can everybody hear me? 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes. 15 MS. SOLOMON: Okay. Okay. Good. So I'm late to understanding everything 16 17 that's been going on, you know, regarding the 18 Tower Ford property. And there are two 19 things that I think are very important for 20 you as trustees to consider. 21 It's usually customary for villages that 2.2 have landmark commissions to occasionally 23 reach out to other villages that have 24 landmark commissions. And you're very

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fortunate that there are several landmark commissions in this general area, especially the Village of Great Neck Plaza.

And I would strongly encourage both the trustees as well as the village landmark commission to talk with these other boards and also to consult with the New York State Historic Preservation office, which I understand has issued a determination eligibility, you know, for this property.

So I hope you will take what little time remains or extend the review period beyond the January 4th hearing for the Landmark Commission so that you can educate yourselves about the importance of this particular property as well as of the general concern for historic preservation in the Great Neck peninsula in general.

I think it's an understatement at this point to say that there is tremendous passion for preserving this building. And by not giving a full and thorough review process, you're going to come back to this same acrimonious type of hearing.

And, you know, I really respect the fact that all of you are basically volunteers, you know, and working, you know, in the Village of Thomaston and trying to serve the community. But I think it's also essential that the process that other villages have adopted is much more open and much more democratic. I mean, even just this format of having it as a webinar rather than a Zoom meeting I think is problematic.

The other suggestion I have for you is to take a look at the designation of the Village of Great Neck Plaza as a Preserve America Community. You might have noticed -- I hope you've noticed that over the years there's been a sign almost directly opposite the Tower Ford property that says, you know, Village of Great Neck Plaza is a Preserve America Community. It's a very colorful sign.

And at the time, you know, I was part of the project team that worked with Mayor Jean Celender and the Board of Trustees to apply for that designation. And I would hate to

see, you know, whatever, you know, might come before you in terms of the Tower Ford property as jeopardizing that. You know, the Tower Ford property was not in the village's, you know, jurisdiction unfortunately, but is certainly one of the most essential parts of the narrative of the Great Neck peninsula, which, you know, at that time was one of the first centers to promote auto travel, and developed around servicing the people who were coming to the Great Neck peninsula back in the 1920s.

So I hope you will consider this seriously. And I also hope that you will reach out to myself, Preservation Long Island, the State Historic Preservation office, you know, for, you know, guidance as well as, you know, reflections on the importance of this property.

Thank you.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Ms. Solomon, thank you.

The January 4th -- there's nothing ending on

January 4th. January 4th is just the

beginning. There is no deadline. And I'm

1	sure Denise will forward the comments to the
2	preservation commission. If you wish to
3	reach out to them, you're more than welcome
4	to do so as well.
5	Thank you.
6	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: We'll
7	try Dr. Martin again.
8	Dr. Martin, are you there? You need to
9	unmute. We can see your computer version.
10	DR. MARTIN: What?
11	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Dr.
12	Martin, we're trying to allow you to speak.
13	DR. MARTIN: My concern is that the
14	hello.
15	MAYOR WEINBERG: Dr. Martin, can you hear
16	us?
17	DR. MARTIN: I hear you well.
18	MAYOR WEINBERG: We can hear you. Can
19	you just disconnect your phone? Maybe we can
20	just do it through the computer.
21	DR. MARTIN: How's that?
22	MAYOR WEINBERG: Much better.
23	DR. MARTIN: My concern is only the
24	building and the inappropriateness of it and

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the fact that the community was not considered in the plans for this edifice.

The inappropriateness of it surprised me because I never really understood how all of you very smart people should allow a building of this type even to be suggested.

Aside from demolishing the Tower Ford

landmark, why would you build such an

inappropriate building? And why would you

allow a planner to offer you such an

inappropriate building? Because that is a

large part of the incentive or the hostility

that you're experiencing.

I don't really know who said what when, what laws were put in or not put in or manipulated or whatever. But the garishness and the inappropriateness of this building is so ostentatiously obviously that I'm extremely puzzled as to how it got this far.

But I would like to have some kind of a communication with all of you to allow for a resolution of this where everyone comes out satisfied and comfortable. And that's my main motivation. And I urge you to think in

terms of allowing everyone to some extent be 1 2 satisfied by your conclusions and your 3 determinations. That's really my position. Thank you. 4 5 MAYOR WEINBERG: I think your comments 6 are on point and will be followed. Thank you 7 very much, Dr. Martin. 8 DR. MARTIN: Thank you. 9 MAYOR WEINBERG: Do we have someone else? VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Aaron 10 11 Halpern. MR. HALPERN: Good evening everybody. 12 13 Can you hear me? 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes, we can hear you. 15 MR. HALPERN: Okay. Great. So just first I -- obviously like everyone else 16 17 you've heard today, I am in favor of 18 repealing the law. My concern, and it 19 certainly echoes what you've heard, is why it 20 took us to this point to get here to repeal 21 the law that should never have been put 2.2 forward in the first place. 23 And I guess I go back to how it got here 24 and how this incentive law -- let's use the

term "incentive law," because this was a law.

There is no incentive to the village,

certainly not a reasonable incentive. But

notwithstanding that, this incentive law -
and this is a feeling shared by everyone who

has spoken and those who haven't spoken yet,

but -- of the more than 700 people who signed

the petition, that this was an incentive law

that was passed under false pretenses.

And why do I say that? And why it is supported in the record that we have seen so far is that firstly going in -- and now we have the benefit frankly of recordings that took place during these various meetings going back to June. I believe there were three meetings. There was a June meeting on SEQRA and a July meeting when this unfortunate law was passed under false pretenses, and then the August meeting when we were all shipped out of village hall.

But what was never disclosed during any of the votes that were had with the Board of Trustees is that this -- what got you there even in June of 2021 was a longstanding

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dialogue that no one except for the Mayor and Mr. Limmer who represented the developer -- we don't even know whether they own or don't own the property. We suspect they don't.

But there was no disclosure at least that after a long series of communications, whatever, we are considering moving forward on incentive law to do whatever we intend to do. That was never discussed. These were discussions. And the record reflects. And I'm not speaking -- I'm not coming up with facts in thin air.

There were many, many FOIL responses to many, many FOIL requests. And the e-mails that we have seen show that beginning around April of 2020 Mayor Weinberg was presented at least or initiated a conversation by the developer for this plan. But this was never discussed, disclosed to the trustees. Forget about the public, you know.

Mr. Mayor, you mentioned public comment and public process. That was never part of this all the way through and until after the law was enacted, okay. It was only until

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after the law was enacted that the public comment and public process occurred. And unfortunately it never occurred by way of a meeting like we're having now or an in-person meeting or any type of Zoom meeting.

It unfortunately occurred by way of -really the catalyst to bring this all about
and all of this repeal, the petitioner
withdrawing its application, was
unfortunately a lawsuit that was brought to
get done what couldn't be done through the
public comment and public process. It's
unfortunate that it had to go to that.

But nowhere during that June or July meeting, but especially the July meeting, was any of the discussions — and there were more than just discussions, by the way. I'm using the term loosely. There were more than just discussions. There were plans and presentations. There were PowerPoints of what the plans and the evolution of these plans looked like. Not shared with any member of the public. Not shared by any member of the Board of Trustees, okay.

I'm not -- again, this is not inventing facts. These are the facts based upon what has been disclosed by the FOIL responses provided by the village, okay. That was never even mentioned during any of the deliberations, any of the presentations to the Board of Trustees. They essentially voted in a vacuum, okay.

And, in fact — and again we have benefit of the recordings. But the recordings reflect that on at least two occasions prior to the vote of July the Mayor was asked about whether this proposed incentive law was for a specific property. And this issue had been brought up a number of times because an issue of spot zoning and whether this "incentive law" was specifically enacted, specifically drafted for the benefit of one property, the Tower Ford property. Whether it's part of two parcels or whatever, it's one property. We all know that, okay.

The -- and, Mr. Mayor, you're heard on the recording saying that the incentive law was applicable to "any commercial property to

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change to residential zoning." And then you were asked again for a little more clarity.

Because to some of the members it was a little -- it was nebulous, your response.

And then said the specific -- you responded, I will tell you. I will come to that in new business. That was when you were going to fully respond.

And you say -- there was a question as far as what benefit this will bring, i.e., the incentive. Mr. Pang rightfully raised that question. And Mr. Mayor responded, absolutely. I am not trying to be cryptic. I will gladly tell you what the benefits -- I can tell you what the benefits are once we enact the law, okay.

The problem is none of that was -- none of the information as far as the specifics, the right questions were asked. And there was no answer to them. Well, the truth is that this zoning law was enacted for one specific property. And we know this because in relation to a filing, my understanding -- and I don't practice this facet of the law --

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but the village has to make filings with the county. And Mr. Levin was part of that.

And there was communication between the county and Mr. Levin. The -- I believe the division of planning of the development of public works. And on June 16, 2021 -- again this is before the July meeting -- the individual from the Nassau County -- the Department of Public Works asked. The incentive zoning provision appears to apply to a specific property within the village. If so, what is the location of the property? Okay.

There was a response by Mr. Levin the next day. The property likely to file for this is 124 Middle Neck Road. And then the county official wrote back, also what is currently on the site? Thanks. And Mr. Levin responded, The street address is actually 124 South Middle Neck Road. Currently on the site is Tower Ford.

So there's been a lot of communications, spot zoning or not, whether this applies to this specific property. The proof is in the

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exchange to the county by our own village attorney. Clearly this applied to one property. Clearly the representations made to the trustees that this was any property, any generic property was not correct.

It was not -- so not only did they not know of the long standing discussions and dialogues -- and I would say even further negotiations, okay, because there were various renditions and plans exchanged and presented to you, Mr. Mayor. That was never disclosed. But not only was that not disclosed, but it was materially relevant to identify -- why not just identify to the trustees before they vote that this applied to one property. What's the harm? What's the harm?

We're all -- listen. We respect you all.

You all volunteer your time. You're all -
this is all public service, okay. But on the

other hand there's a village involved here

and there are residents involved. And

clearly, clearly this has gotten the

attention of many village residents who are

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very concerned. Many people who have never
been involved in local politics -- believe me
-- are now involved in local politics.

Now, Mr. Mayor, I do appreciate you saying that you do not have the authority to enter into an agreement or issue a permit.

But why would you under these pretenses bypass what protections in the laws that we have in our village? We have laws and protections that would have allowed this developer, should they have chosen to go forward with this, they would have filed a formal application.

It would have been rejected and denied.

And then there is a Zoning Board of Appeals.

And it would have gone to that layer under notice. And then it would have gone through design review. All of these things were bypassed. These were all protections all subject to hearing, all subject to notice at least so that people can attend and voice their opinions.

Instead basically a road map to getting this thing passed. And I do believe this

building would have -- the application would 1 2 have been passed, would not have been 3 withdrawn but for that lawsuit. And unfortunately it had to come to that. 4 5 The incentive law -- and this is all --6 this law was, my understanding, enacted under 7 a New York State incentive law was designed 8 as I understand it to improve communities, to 9 basically gentrify those parts of a village 10 or town that needed development to improve, 11 and offer incentive to the village. That is 12 certainly not what occurred here, as 13 evidenced by all of the commentary by the 14 residents. 15 Thank you. 16 MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you, Mr. Halpern. 17 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay. 18 We have Julie G. Please unmute Julie G. 19 Okay. Doesn't appear that Julie G. is on. 20 I will take Ronald Brinn is waiting. 21 MR. BRINN: I'm here. I don't know if 2.2 you can hear me. 23 MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes, we can. 24 MR. BRINN: Okay. It's Ronald Brinn.

So I can't make any vote or judgment on the repeal or the non-repeal of the item that you haven't described. I was hoping you would give us a synopsis of what this repeal was in the first place, but you haven't done that. So it's another example of a very nontransparent approach to governance.

Is the repeal -- is the repeal a way to forestall an inevitable big mega development project that Tower Ford will become that glass edifice? Because it seems like you've got 1,000 people who can see right through that glass building. You know, whether you repeal or you don't repeal, it just sounds like you're playing for time.

I've been observing this. And, you know,

I'm not -- I don't live in -- I don't live

there. I'm in -- I'm in the unincorporated

village, Lakeville Village. Lakeville part

of -- I call it "Good Neck," you know. It's

Good Neck. But it still has that Dickens

flavor. And I guess what I'm telling you is

that it if you really look around with

Chrysler and Gatsby Lane and you really look

around at the harlequin (phonetic), on top of that conical building in town and you really open your eyes, you'll see that you're a steward, part of stewardship of the most incredible historic architectural beauty that you will find anywhere, let alone the first major suburban town outside of Manhattan.

And here is a pop quiz. Do you know who the architect was who designed the Empire State Building? Times up. It's the guy who did the architectural design for the Tower Ford building. And it's not a Ford building. It's a tower, a castle, an edifice in history that spans heads and shoulders above anything you will find anywhere, anywhere, anywhere in the world.

just off Shore. I mean, we have gems. And you've got 1,000 people, 1,000 people telling you that what you're trying to do is wrong.

And you haven't responded in any way, shape, manner or form that gives them the slightest hope that you will do the right thing.

I've been observing this meeting. And

your governance is abysmal. Your

transparency is zero. Your credibility now

is like bupkis. You know what I'm saying,

bupkis? Nothing. There's no credibility

left because you haven't really empathized.

And I don't think you really know where

you're sitting and what you truly represent

and what your job really is. You know,

government serves the community. Communities

don't serve a small handful of people who

know people in government to churn millions

of dollars. That's not really what this is

all about.

I have to commend every single person who spoke. And I am feeling 100 percent what they're feeling: that they are about to be railroaded. When they say that you're pulling the wool over their eyes, you're blinding them. They can't see. They can't hear. They can't speak because you're doing an arrogant -- you know, arrogant style of governing.

And you got a big law firm sitting up there. And they still haven't moved the

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banner off the wall: Meyer Suozzi. I mean, that's a force to be reckoned with. I mean, what does that mean, that whatever it is you guys want to do you can just do it because you're the all mighty powerful Kabal? All of your trustees are on mute right now. They can't even speak.

I mean, Pang said something, but it was almost -- I couldn't even make it out. He was desperately trying to say that your communications are piss poor. And he's absolutely right. But you didn't want to communicate. You never wanted to share information with the community. You wanted to just run right over them.

And when they caught you in the act and said what you're doing is wrong, instead of opening up the process, you threw them out of the building. And that's when you really lost it. And you'll keep denying it. And you'll keep coming up with a story about how this is not what happened and it's not what I did and how I didn't enlist my secretary to time stamp this document and I didn't have a

private meeting with this one or that one or the other one.

But in the meantime we're seeing a picture of a major glass piece of junk where a historical icon stands. I don't even think Ford should be in there. I don't think Lexus should go in there. I don't think a car company should have anything to do with that because that's the past. The history: immutable, irreparable, priceless.

Cars, they come and go. Governments, they come and go. Trustees, they're going to up and quit. I could hear it now. I don't need this aggravation. Who needs this aggravation? How are you going to -- how are you going to proceed from here in? Because this is not about repealing anything. This ain't prohibition. This is real life.

And I don't think, you know -- whenever this happens I tune in and I say you can't buy for love or money the wonder that's Great Neck. But it's being hacked away left and right by people who don't really care and are looking to take a piece of the action and

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don't really care. And I care. Otherwise I
wouldn't be shooting my mouth off and making
my comments.

I care. And I think the 900, the 1,000 people, the people that are speaking to you, they're trying to get your attention.

They're trying to get your attention. And you haven't shown any interest. You've just been denying, disputing. And then you get to the point where you say, I'm sorry. Your time is up.

And all those old government tricks, you know, how to run a public meeting, a public hearing, it's like pro forma junk. It doesn't get you to the solution. And the solution in this case is you tell those people that if they want to create housing, they want to develop a project, go find a place where we feel it would be beneficial to the entire community where it would be a tribute.

You want to cut the ribbon in front of the tower castle building one day, fine. But leave it alone. Don't mess with it. Don't

say you're going to keep a facade and we'll have a nice lobby. Because I made a joke. I said, yeah. You'll come to terms with this and everyone will say, okay, here's the deal. We'll take pictures of the front of the building. We'll frame them. And we'll hang them in the mens room and the ladies room in the basement. And everyone will see the Tower Ford building. And when you go use the facilities you will be able to see the building. Because that's what developers really want to do. And mayors should stand up against that. Mayor's attorneys should say no, no, no, no, no. I got other ways to make a buck.

This is not the way. This is not because -- you got to live with yourself. So if you're allowing the repeal of this, giving permission to call in and say yeah, I'll repeal, I'll repeal, I'll repeal, just to alleviate pressure so that you can come around again with this stupid mega project, get that out of your head. Because the community is not going for it. What they

want is they want justice. They want a just 1 2 deal in Thomaston. They want integrity. 3 They want transparency. They want good governance. They want honesty. 4 5 And you kind of -- at this point you blew 6 it. You just blew it on so many different 7 levels. I don't know how you guys are going 8 to fix this. Maybe you're going to double 9 down and just, you know, push right through. 10 That seems to be where you're at, just 11 telling everyone you're wrong, you're wrong, 12 you're wrong, take a hike. And that's not 13 going to get it. It's almost 2022. It's not 14 going to get it. 15 And so for every person who spoke, it's a 16 mitzvah. For you it's a major challenge. 17 And I think what they're looking for is a 18 profile in courage. And they're not seeing 19 one. They're not seeing one. The trustees 20 are still on mute. 21 MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Brinn --22 MR. BRINN: I'm going to stop just before 23 you say time is up. 24 MAYOR WEINBERG: -- this is not about

buying time. This is not to push it through. 1 2 This is not to railroad this through. I am 3 not the applicant. This is not proceeding. It was withdrawn. The law is being repealed. 4 5 And we are listening and understand what the 6 community wants in terms of communication. 7 And that's what -- if there's anything to 8 address, that's how it will be addressed in 9 the future. 10 Thank you. 11 MR. BRINN: Thank you. 12 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay. 13 We have a Karl waiting. 14 MR. SCHUTTE: Yes. I pretty much just 15 presented my question to the Mayor and 16 specifically -- because he is an elected 17 official. And there's so many people --18 MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sorry, Karl. Would 19 you -- give us your last name and address, 20 please. 21 MR. SCHUTTE: Sure. It's Karl Schutte. 22 It's at 133 Shorewood Drive, Great Neck, New 23 York. Thomaston. 24 MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.

MR. SCHUTTE: You're welcome.

And I just have a simple question. I'm not involved in all the legalities. But the people of Thomaston and Russell Gardens are very against this project, and for a number of reasons. And mainly it's going to devalue the properties of the residences within Thomaston and Russell Gardens. And I don't see any strong reason to go forward with a project like this. You're an elected official. Whether you're paid or not paid, I have no idea.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Not paid. Volunteer, like everyone on the Board.

MR. SCHUTTE: Right. But basically the people -- the residents are against this.

And I would think that you would follow the wishes of the people who vote you into office plain and simple. Not for the developer.

And that's pretty much it, Mayor.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.

That was in my statement. I am not for the developer. We gave the opinion that we would not be vote -- the Board would not vote

1	against the community wishes. And again, the
2	project has been withdrawn. This is a
3	measure to repeal the law. I do I assume
4	correctly you're in favor of repealing the
5	law?
6	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Wait.
7	I'm sorry. I thought that you were done.
8	TRUSTEE WESTON: We lost Karl.
9	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: We don't
10	have Karl. Let me see if I can find Karl
11	again.
12	MAYOR WEINBERG: That's all right.
13	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Karl, if
14	you want to speak again, you can raise your
15	hand again. I can't see you. Here we are.
16	All right, Karl. I have you back.
17	MR. SCHUTTE: Yeah.
18	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: If you
19	wish to sorry about that.
20	MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sorry. I'm assuming
21	you're in favor of repealing the law?
22	MR. SCHUTTE: Whatever it takes for this
23	project not to go forward is what should be
24	done.

1	MAYOR WEINBERG: It's been withdrawn.
2	This project is not going forward.
3	MR. SCHUTTE: Great.
4	MAYOR WEINBERG: We will repeal it as
5	well.
6	MR. SCHUTTE: All right. Sounds good.
7	Thank you.
8	MAYOR WEINBERG: Next please.
9	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
10	Let me see. All right. We have Julie G. I
11	will try again. Julie G, are you there?
12	Please unmute.
13	MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Hi. Can you hear me?
14	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Yes.
15	MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Okay. Great. So my
16	name is Julie Georgopoulos. I'm a resident
17	of Thomaston in Belgrave Square.
18	I have a specific question. It's more of
19	a technical question, since the attorney and
20	the Mayor are both on the phone. I'm really
21	I just wanted to know regarding the second
22	to last paragraph of the existing of this
23	law. It says, Notwithstanding the expiration
24	of this law, the provisions of this law shall

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continue and remain in effect with respect to any application for incentive zoning purpose that was filed before such expiration date etc., etc.

I just want to confirm that by repealing this law we're also repealing that fact.

Because there was an application that was filed before the expiration date. And, therefore, that sort of leaves like a back door for somebody to potentially reapply. So I just want to make sure that repealing this law will revert back to the original zoning law and not allow somebody to back into this old law. It's just going to go away? That's my main concern.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Levin.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Yes. I would be happy to respond to that.

First with respect to the part of the old law, the current law, Local Law 3 that you just quoted, that would apply in the case of an application that is still pending. When the window closed on December 16th, the law would continue to apply to that application,

but there is no application pending. So 1 2 that --3 MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Actually I think that's the subsequent --4 5 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Let me finish. 6 You asked a question. Let me finish 7 answering. All right. 8 So No. 1, that paragraph doesn't apply to 9 anything at this point. There is no such 10 application. The window is closed. You 11 cannot make another application under this law. 12 13 And secondly, the repeal of this law, 14 yes, it would remove the -- the entire Local 15 Law 3 would be removed from the code. 16 MS. GEORGOPOULOS: So it basically 17 doesn't leave any potential for somebody to 18 try and back into that? And any future 19 applications will have to comply with the 20 current, which is like the original zoning laws? 21 22 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: That's correct. 23 MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Is that right? 24 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: That's correct.

MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Okay. Just one 1 2 question. Just a general question for my own 3 edification. Again, we have a licensed architect who 4 5 is our village inspector. And I wanted to know if he was consulted when this law was 6 7 being put together. Because obviously he's 8 the only "building professional." And he 9 would ultimately have to approve any permits 10 that go through on this project. 11 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: I'm not in a 12 position to answer that because I don't know 13 what the answer is. But it's not relevant to 14 tonight's hearing, No. 1, which is only on 15 repealing --16 MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Well, I think you just 17 heard for future --18 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: If you keep 19 interrupting me I will stop talking. 20 MS. GEORGOPOULOS: I think in the future 21 it will be important that he's involved. 2.2 Because obviously he's responsible for 23 approving any permits for development is what 24 -- according to our laws anyway. So that's

1 really my comments. But thank you.

2.2

MAYOR WEINBERG: Tom, is there a point in the process where the building inspector gets involved?

What process you're talking about. The building inspector gets involved at some point when a project is filed and it has to be determined whether it conforms to the zoning laws or not and whether it's an authorized project. This project has never been an authorized project.

The only thing the village did was allow an application for a project to be made.

That application was made. It never got heard. It was withdrawn. It's not pending.

I don't know what else I can do to answer that.

I really don't want to try to argue with people who keep interrupting me. They asked me a question and won't let me answer. So I prefer not to answer.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you. Julie, thank you for your comment and suggestion.

1	MS. GEORGOPOULOS: Thank you.
2	MAYOR WEINBERG: Denise.
3	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
4	Olivia Pinsley.
5	MS. PINSLEY: Really quick. I'm Olivia
6	Pinsley. And I live at 30 Brompton Road.
7	Mr. Levin, you do have to answer people's
8	questions. You are the village attorney.
9	And anyone here who has a question for you, I
10	think that you should be answering it. We
11	pay your salary, whatever money you're
12	getting.
13	I can't speak as eloquently as the
14	previous people before me. But everybody
15	who's on this call Denise, how many people
16	are on this meeting? Because we can't tell.
17	How many people are on here?
18	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There's
19	51 attendees
20	MS. PINSLEY: That's great. Okay. I
21	want
22	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: plus
23	the Board.
24	MS. PINSLEY: I want all those attendees

who are not on the Board of Trustees or the Mayor or lawyer to know that everything that Aaron Halpern, Wendy Halpern said, Nancy Sherman, Alka Jain and Ronald Brinn is 100 percent true. These are not accusations. We never spoke about bribes. Everything that we — has been spoken is fact.

So I'm not going to repeat everything that everybody else said. But I'm curious to know moving forward, Mayor, what do you understand that we want moving forward?

Because obviously we don't want this monstrosity. You're talking about repealing a law that's already expired. So that's — so that's nonsense.

And basically what do you understand the constituents of the Village of Thomaston and obviously outside of Thomaston what exactly we want? What do you understand we want?

Because you say that you care about us and that you work for us. So moving forward what are you saying when it comes to this development?

MAYOR WEINBERG: There's nothing to say

about this development because there is no 1 development. If there is a future 2 3 development or interest in making a development, you will know about it and you 4 5 will be a part of the process as soon as I know about it. And we'll have an open 6 7 dialogue from day one. 8 MS. PINSLEY: Okay. 9 MAYOR WEINBERG: That's what you want. 10 And that's what you deserve. And that's what 11 you're entitled to. 12 MS. PINSLEY: Correct. That's exactly 13 right. 14 And do you agree not to create another 15 incentive law for this property for this 16 particular developer who may scale down the 17 development and make it maybe 65 units 18 instead? Do you agree not to create another 19 incentive law specifically for the property? 20 MAYOR WEINBERG: No. Tonight is not 21 Let's Make a Deal. It's to repeal this law. 22 And you --23 MS. PINSLEY: It's already repealed. 24 MAYOR WEINBERG: And if -- if -- can I

finish? 1 2 MS. PINSLEY: Sure. 3 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. In terms of whether there is a zoning variance or an 4 5 incentive zoning application, you will be a part of the process. Period. It's a matter 6 7 of not agreeing or foreclosing options or limiting options or broadening options. It's 8 9 a matter of what's in the village's best 10 interest. If that's in the best interest, 11 you will be a part of it --MS. PINSLEY: Okay. One final comment. 12 13 MAYOR WEINBERG: -- and that's it. 14 MS. PINSLEY: Yeah. 15 MAYOR WEINBERG: I don't make it. 16 application has to come from the owner. 17 MS. PINSLEY: Is the applicant that we 18 already had for 124 S. Middle Neck Road, is 19 he going to be covering the expenses of the 20 lawyer and the consultant that the -- the 21 time and money that went into this? 2.2 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is beyond the scope 23 of the hearing. I believe it was covered 24 with respect to the application.

MS. PINSLEY: Okay. And my final thought is I want everybody on the Board and Mr.

Levin and you may, Mayor, to understand how much time and effort, aggravation, distress, disgust, mistrust that everyone who lives in the Village of Thomaston has towards what happened here. I listened to everything that everybody said. And I know all of this already because I've been lucky enough to work with these people. And they've let me help them in any way that I can. And the fact that we have to go to such lengths and expense and money to stop this is disgraceful. And it saddens me greatly. And I've lived in this community for 25 years.

And I truly hope, Mayor, in your time that you're here -- because I don't think you'll be voted again to be mayor quite honestly. And, Mr. Levin, I think you should resign as well -- that you listen to the people of the village and not do this secretive sneaky behavior behind everybody's back. Because nobody trusts you, Mr. Mayor, and you, Mr. Levin, honestly. The Board of

Trustees had no involvement with this because 1 2 I think they were kept in the dark as well. 3 Those were my final thoughts. MAYOR WEINBERG: Denise, is there someone 4 else? 5 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There 6 7 are three hands raised, but they're from 8 folks who already spoke: Sara Blumenstein, 9 Lynn Zysman and Ronald Brinn. 10 MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sorry. 11 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: 12 three hands raised. But they're all people 13 who had spoken earlier. Lynn Zysman is one. 14 Ronald Brinn. Sara Blumenstein put down her 15 hand, so she's not there. And Olivia Pinsley 16 still has her hand raised. 17 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. All right. 18 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Do you 19 wish to recognize anyone for a second time? 20 We're down to Ronald Brinn and Lynn Zysman. 21 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. If they can be 2.2 brief. One minute a piece. This way the 23 Board can discuss and we can move forward. 24 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.

Lynn Zysman.

MS. ZYSMAN: When I spoke before -- I'll reiterate. I'm in favor of repealing the law. I agree with everything that's been said.

But, Mr. Mayor, you said you want us -you want to do what everybody wants in the
village. I would like you to replace the two
people that you put on that Landmark
Committee. They have absolutely no
qualifications to be there. They told us
they have no qualifications to be there.

We have residents in the community that
have extensive knowledge and -- to be able to
-- to be able to represent the Landmark
Committee in a fair way. The two people you
put on the Board are business men. And they
did say they have no experience in this area.

I would like you to reconsider and place somebody in there that has the experience to be on it. I checked with the Village of Roslyn to see who's on their board. And they have all experienced peoples in preservation and landmarking.

2.2

So that's my request, to please put somebody on there where it would be fair and balanced and we can get a good sense of what the commission is made of.

Thank you.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Brinn.

MR. BRINN: Okay. I've unmuted myself.

So between the time I last spoke and the time I asked to speak again, it seems to me very clear that you've been asked whether you can represent that no such project will occur at that location. I think what they're asking you is to represent and to say that that — that site, that historic site will not be developed, will not be razed or changed or developed. That it will be held harmless.

And I didn't hear you say yes. I heard you say that's not with this meeting is about. It's about the repeal of the law.

And it's strange because it's a law you created and then uncreated. And it seems quite convenient that you did that. And so you're just backing off. And I would hate

for the community to think that they've dealt 1 2 with this and that you have accepted the most 3 important points when in reality you haven't. You and your attorney have dug in your heels. 4 5 And you've had a big meeting tonight. And I think you probably think that because 6 7 you had this meeting you can go skin this cat 8 a different way. And I would be -- I would 9 be very, very shocked -- I would be shocked 10 to think the community would go for that. I 11 believe the community knows that you're 12 probably trying to come up with a way to revisit this and get it done in another way. 13 14 And even though you are an unpaid mayor --15 MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Brinn, I'm sorry. 16 I'm sorry, Mr. Brinn, you are repeating 17 yourself. 18 MR. BRINN: No. No. I'm not 19 repeating myself. 20 MAYOR WEINBERG: You're repeating 21 yourself. And I told you before I'm not 2.2 going to do this another way. 23 Do you have anything else to add, or we 24 can move on to -- so that we can get to the

other business? 1 2 MR. BRINN: That's the point. You can't 3 move on until you told the community that you're not going to do this thing with the 4 5 Tower Ford building. You can't move on. You're stuck. You can move on the meeting, 6 7 but you can't move off the point. 8 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay, thank you, Mr. 9 Brinn. 10 MR. BRINN: Thank you. 11 MAYOR WEINBERG: Anyone else, Denise? 12 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There is 13 a Lyda Zissimatos who hasn't spoken. 14 MS. ZISSIMATOS: Good evening. How are 15 you? 16 I guess by now it's pretty obvious that 17 the community is strongly opposed to anything 18 going on with Tower Ford. I do also agree 19 that we should change who's on the Landmark 20 Committee and have specialists there. 21 And I also think that going forward we 2.2 should work together as a community to use 23 Tower Ford possibly for some kind of a social 24 community building, something that we could

1	do that would be wonderful for our community.
2	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.
3	MS. ZISSIMATOS: Something to consider.
4	Thank you.
5	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you very much.
6	MS. ZISSIMATOS: I'm at 37 Brompton Road,
7	by the way.
8	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.
9	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
10	The hands up are Ronald Brinn, Wendy Halpern
11	and Nancy Sherman.
12	MAYOR WEINBERG: I think we need to
13	conclude this hearing, unless the rest of the
14	Board wants to hear from repeat speakers.
15	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.
16	The only hand left is Wendy Halpern. Ms.
17	Halpern just lowered her hand.
18	MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.
19	VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: No.
20	It's back. Okay. It's back up and Nancy.
21	TRUSTEE MONOSON: And Nancy Sherman.
22	MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. These are the
23	last two speakers. If you will please keep
24	it to one minute we can then consider the

business. Thank you.

VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Ms. Halpern, you're on.

MS. HALPERN: Hi. So first I want to thank you for your time. I'm going to speak very quick because I only have one minute.

You said throughout this entire meeting that you care so much about the village and that you want to encourage public participation. As you know, we have made many, many requests to adjourn so that our consultant and the village consultant that we spent \$6,000 -- that the village spent \$6,000 on can have more time.

Mr. Levin is advising the commission.

And the Board here as the commission members have said that we will have more than the one day. But until that will -- that is set in stone, we need to make sure -- we need to prepare. And we're killing ourselves against -- over holidays and COVID to meet your January 4th deadline.

And we respectfully request that you put on this record that there will in fact be at

least one more or two more hearing dates so we don't have to prepare and ruin another vacation and holiday. You spent \$6,000 of the village money on consultants. And they need to have the time to go in and find the records and get the right answer.

And to have a hearing on the Tuesday after the New Year's weekend is absolutely ridiculous. You're all attorneys. And you very well know that not a single judge would not grant an adjournment if made a request on this basis. And it's absolutely ridiculous and it contradicts everything you just told us for 2 hours to deny that adjournment.

So I'm asking you in front of everybody to please commit that there will be additional hearings right now so that if we don't have our evidence ready on January 4th we will be guaranteed an opportunity to present our evidence at a future date.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. I told you -
MS. HALPERN: Don't say that it's the

commission's decision on that. Because I

know that Mr. Levin drafted the resolutions

which were placed on the website before the commission even voted. And Mr. Levin -- we're paying him to advise the Landmark Commission. And he can tell them that such an adjournment is reasonable.

And I also want to clarify that the

Village of Roslyn does not hire consultants

because they already designated their entire

village landmarks, okay. So that's our

request. And if you really want to put your

action -- your actions the way your words

are, you will grant this request right now or

make a commitment that you will advise the

commission to adjourn it. Let's see you put

your actions into words if you really care

about what your constituents are saying,

okay.

Thank you.

MAYOR WEINBERG: This is not adversarial. This is not one on one  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{--}}$ 

MS. HALPERN: Yes, it is. You made it adversarial because we keep getting -- four times for requests and denied --

MAYOR WEINBERG: You've gone way beyond

the one minute. Mr. Levin can address 1 2 anything you --3 MS. HALPERN: Yes. Mr. Levin, please address it. 4 MAYOR WEINBERG: Your comments will be 5 6 forwarded to the Landmark Commission. I just 7 want the record to be clear. The Mayor of 8 the Board of Trustees do not set the --9 MS. HALPERN: I would like the record to 10 be clear that the draft resolution setting 11 the date was on the village's website before the commission even voted. Before the 12 13 commission even set that date. They were on 14 the village's website for November 30th. 15 Just why do you have to aggravate us? That's 16 the whole point here, Mr. Mayor. That is the 17 point. And you missed --18 MAYOR WEINBERG: The Mayor has -- again, 19 the Mayor has nothing to do with the Landmark 20 Preservation Commission. 21 MS. HALPERN: All right. Mr Levin is 2.2 advising the commission -- Mr. Levin, can you 23 please unmute yourself and tell us that you 24 will advise the commission that it's entirely

reasonable and due process to adjourn the 1 2 January 4th date or at least advise that 3 there will be a continuance. And you know it's totally ridiculous and contradictory to 4 5 everything you're saying to say it's January 4th and that's it, especially since you 6 overruled three members of the Landmark 7 8 Commission who didn't think a consultant was 9 necessary and spend \$6,000 more of the 10 village's money on a consultant that's not 11 going to be able to finish the job. They 12 were completely reasonable. This building 13 has been up for over 100 years, and you're 14 going to decide it 35 days over Christmas 15 holidays when all the buildings are closed. 16 So just be reasonable for once and just 17 do what the residents are asking you. I 18 don't understand why it's so difficult for 19 you. It's dense --20 MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Levin --21 MS. HALPERN: -- honestly. 2.2 MAYOR WEINBERG: We don't have to make 23 this personal, but thank you. 24 MS. HALPERN: It's not personal, Mayor.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Mr. Levin. 1 2 VILLAGE ATTORNEY LEVIN: Well, first of 3 all I will decline discussing any advice that I give my clients, as Ms. Halpern perfectly 4 5 well knows is improper for an attorney to do. Second of all, whatever advice I give to 6 7 a client, the commission makes its own 8 decision what it wants to do. I don't. And 9 they can act contrary to my advice or they 10 can act in accordance with my advice. 11 That's all that I have to say about it. 12 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Thank you. 13 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: And the 14 only other hand up is Nancy Sherman. Do you 15 wish to let Ms. Sherman speak again? 16 MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes. If we can keep it 17 to one minute please. Thank you. 18 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Ms. 19 Sherman. MS. SHERMAN: Yes. I just unmuted 20 21 myself. Thank you. 22 All right. Mr. Weinberg, I have a 23 question for you. I have three actually. 24 Were you aware that JPB Capital, who is the

parent company for 124 Realty -- Middle Neck 1 2 Realty was under indictment, under federal 3 indictment actually at the time you were negotiating with them for this development? 4 5 Yes or no. MAYOR WEINBERG: This is not an 6 7 examination. 8 MS. SHERMAN: I just want to --9 MAYOR WEINBERG: We're not going to have 10 a question and answer session. If you want 11 to -- if there is a comment you wish to make, that will be fine. 12 13 MS. SHERMAN: Okay. I will tell the 14 public that JPB Capital, the parent company 15 of who owns Tower Ford, is presently under 16 federal indictment. And it was under 17 indictment at the time that the Mayor was 18 negotiating with them. 19 My second -- my question is to you, Mr. 20 Mayor. Have you been in contact with the 21 developer since they withdrew their 2.2 application? 23 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is -- again, we're 24 not going to have a question and answer. If

you wish -- if you --1 2 MS. SHERMAN: I'm going to rephrase my 3 question very simply. MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. 4 5 MS. SHERMAN: Has the developer contacted 6 you and have you spoken with the developer 7 about them putting in a new application for 8 this once -- once the Landmark Commission is 9 finished with their presentation? 10 MAYOR WEINBERG: I already addressed this 11 very, very, very, very clearly. 12 MS. SHERMAN: So then you can answer it. 13 MAYOR WEINBERG: That is not buying time 14 for something else, okay. 15 MS. SHERMAN: That's not answering my 16 question. 17 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is not -- this is 18 not -- this is not a question and answer 19 session. If you have something else to add 20 for the Board to consider on repealing the 21 law, fine. 22 MS. SHERMAN: I think that it is very 23 important that the public knows -- and if we 24 have to do more FOIL requests, we will --

whether the Mayor has been in contact with the developer and its attorney, Steven

Limmer, with respect to, No. 1, passing a new incentive use law. No. 2, what project they should — they would build in the event landmarking is not approved by the village.

I think that the public has a right to be informed of the answers to these questions.

And, Mr. Mayor, you know them.

So if you're -- you want to be transparent and provide information to the community which by 24 votes puts you in office, then I suggest that you answer those questions. Because if the answer is no, you have not been in contact with the developer, that is fine. If the answer is yes, you have been, and if it's in writing, we'll find out. So be transparent.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there any -- I've been very clear. There's no communication about any new application. There is no new application. There's nothing else. It's already been discussed. I'm saying it again.
