free. We're providing minimum nominal

amounts out of reserve for cash surplus.

Obviously due to the pandemic we have put

some structural improvements on hold at

Village Hall. Hopefully we will be able to

get to that when the pandemic is behind us.

And obviously we continue to maintain the Public Works fleet. We continue to -- we're hoping to get a grant to do the road project next year on Crescent Road, Lincoln Road.

And we continue to offer to plant wire 1 friendly trees in the Village right-of-way. 2 3 And thank you, Jim. We have no plans for any tax increase in the upcoming year. 4 5 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Here here. MAYOR WEINBERG: I will make the motion 6 7 that the tentative budget for '21-'22 fiscal 8 year is hereby approved in the form presented 9 to the Board at the meeting; and it is 10 further 11 RESOLVED, that a public hearing on the 12 proposed budget for the 2021/2022 is hereby 13 scheduled for Monday, January 11, 2021, 7:30 14 p.m. at Village Hall. site with a high bid subject to approval by 1 the Village of Thomaston; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the auction closed with a high bid of \$30,600, which the Village deemed 4 5 unacceptable and therefore declined said 6 offer; and 7 WHEREAS, subsequent to the declination of 8 the high bid, the Superintendent solicited 9 additional proposals for the sale of said 10 vehicle locally; and 11 WHEREAS, on December 7, 2020, the 12 Superintendent of Public Works received a 13 verbal offer of \$60,000 for the purchase of 14 said vehicle by the Town of Brookhaven. 1.5 NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS 16 RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees 17 hereby accepts the offer from the Town of 18 Brookhaven in the amount of \$60,000 for the 19 purchase of the 2013 Freightliner dump truck, 20 and authorizes the Mayor or his designee to 21 execute such documents as may reasonably be 2.2 necessary to effectuate transfer of title. some cracked sealing that was performed with the warm weather. Lawn maintenance. There were some resident requests. And I believe — Denise, we can add to this — there was also I believe some of the lights were replaced along Shorewood just to give a higher wattage along Shorewood.

VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Right.

MAYOR WEINBERG: And obviously the work
that -- obviously cleaning and maintaining
and obviously storm cleanup. And
unfortunately probably our first winter storm
cleanup will occur in the upcoming month
along with the streetlight upgrading wattage
on Shorewood and tree trimming, cracked
sealing if weather permits.

MAYOR WEINBERG: At this point of the meeting we come to New Business. I will also open this to the public. Is there anyone that would like to be heard with respect to New Business?

MR. FRIEDMAN: Yes. This is Marly (phonetic) and Joel Friedman. We live at 22

Crescent Road for the last 22 years. We would like to be able to speak with you,

Mayor Weinberg, and to the Board about the idea that we provided to the Village Clerk.

And we would like to thank her for that as well in disseminating that information to you. We would just ask if you could put the photo in front of you, we would appreciate that --

MAYOR WEINBERG: Yes.

 $\mbox{MR. FRIEDMAN: }--\mbox{ and allow us to speak}$ to this matter.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Please. Go ahead.

MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay. First of all, we were very pleasantly surprised to hear that you have already put this for a public discussion on January 11th. And we are extremely grateful for that. Thank you so much, Mayor Weinberg and to the Board for doing that.

We would like to also, you know, provide evidence as to why this is a very, very important change to the Village Code and now.

Because the installation that's going on

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presently at 20 Crescent Road, if it's allowed to be completed in its present location, it will have permanent effects on our way of life here at 22 Crescent Road.

The first thing we would like to mention is that we will have a permanent noise nuisance right next to our most important living spaces, including our master bedroom, living room, dining room and kitchen. And in case of a power failure and maybe of a short or lengthy duration — we don't know that — sleep and other aspects of normal life will be impossible. Sitting outside on our patio would also be adversely affected. Therefore, it will change our quality of life for as long as we continue to live here.

There is also a permanent safety issue.

Generators of this type produce continuous emissions, including large amounts of deadly carbon monoxide gas. If this installation is allowed to proceed, it's highly likely that the exhaust that's directly facing us and less than 6 feet from our home, including our basement window, will allow CO (carbon

Incorporated Village of Thomaston - 12-14-2020

monoxide) to infiltrate our home, making it deadly to us as we inhabit it, as the two houses are only 10 feet apart to begin with on this side of the house, 20 feet on the other side. Even further it will allow in the event of a no wind situation or low wind situation a tunnel-like effect to be created, ensuring that the exhaust will not easily dissipate, and allowing, therefore, carbon monoxide to enter our premises.

Third, as we spent -- as we've spent a considerable sum of money to landscape that side of the house, those plantings will be impacted severely by having exhaust from the generator blowing directly on them for a lengthy period of time.

There is no question that any potential buyer of our home in the future will see how close this permanent generator is -- it can be noticed from the street by the way -- and will either refuse to make an offer to purchase our home or offer much less than its true value; thereby, causing us to suffer an unknown financial hardship in the future.

When we put our generator in after a 13-day power outage cased by Hurricane Sandy, we requested and the village inspector came to our home. And we asked him to recommend where he felt the generator should be located to cause the least disruption to any of our neighbors, including our neighbors at 20 Crescent Road.

He chose a spot totally across our property and at the 20 foot side from where the natural gas line and the electric service enter our premises and required a much larger outlay of funds than we have budgeted for the project. We understand this was necessary. And in the years since this has had a minimal affect on any neighbor. And we were happy to know that we had done the right thing.

We believe strongly that this building permit must be revoked now for this location, and it must be moved to a location where this adverse effect would not be present. And only then should it be granted. Because the Village Code -- and this is of course you've already addressed this, Mayor Weinberg. And

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we're most grateful for this -- did not include specific requirements for the placements of the whole house natural gas generators on a homeowner's property.

This kind of a situation was able to occur now and will most surely occur with other residents in the future. Because of a lack of these requirements and the desire to the residents at 20 Crescent Road that have their own generator and the desire to avoid the extra costs involved, they took advantage to locate the generator without consideration of the effects it would have on their neighbors and friends of 26 years; thereby, severing our relationship.

In addition to asking the Village to order a less intrusive placement of the currently partially installed generator at 20 Crescent Road, we would also strongly suggest — and we've already done this. And we are very thankful that you have — that the Board of Trustees enact changes to the Village Codes — that is — that's really very nice — outlining specific requirements for

generator placement, as we already have a central air conditioning unit, so that this terrible situation will not occur in the future, thereby causing disharmony between residents of our village and our village government and our residents who have worked so hard to prevent since the incorporation of our Village in 1931. We are sure you are aware that many governmental authorities on Long Island have such ordinances.

Once again we would like to thank you for hearing our arguments and look forward to an outcome that will restore harmony to neighbors around our Village. No Village resident should benefit at the expense of their neighbor.

Thank you.

MAYOR WEINBERG: You're welcome. Thank you for coming. Thank you for giving us your thoughts.

And the Board now can -- not now for public discussion but now can have the benefit of your thoughts and consider that as they review the proposed legislation before

the next Board of Trustees's meeting and before the public hearing.

I also believe you should be aware, but

-- in terms of the -- that this matter has

been brought to the attention of the building

inspector. And the building inspector is

certainly in communication with the

contractor for the project. Because at the

moment there is a difference between the

plans that were submitted as to where the

generator was supposed to be placed as oppose

to where it was physically placed.

So based upon that it is certainly under review by our Department of Buildings and by the inspector. And he will certainly address it. And we will see what the outcome is as to where the placement will be based upon the plans that were submitted as oppose to the physical location of it during the project.

MR. FRIEDMAN: We appreciate that.

MRS. FRIEDMAN: We appreciate that. Thank you.

MR. FRIEDMAN: And we will entertain -- if you have any questions that you would like

to ask us about why we feel the way we feel
and why we feel that this is an inappropriate
placement. And I am not aware of the plans.

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We do believe sincerely that the contractor had no incentive to put the generator in any place other than what the owner wanted. And even though it was very problematic for us, and we were not informed by our neighbors as to where they were going to put it until it actually — the project was actually started, we knew they had a building permit because I called the Village.

And by the way I would like to compliment our village clerk, the excellent response that we got. And also to Ms. Earley your assistant, your deputy. She was actually terrific. She was the one that I spoke to and my wife spoke to as well. I -- actually I think I did twice. My wife did speak to Mr. Brash at 20 Crescent Road. And unfortunately the only thing he said in response was, that's the only place we can put it. And there were no other words exchanged.

But I -- the key thing here is -- and I think I made an emphasis in my presentation -- was the disharmony that this has created between longstanding excellent neighbors of 26 years. And had the guidelines been there -- and I have to say this again because it's so important -- this would not have been able to happen. Because the placement in that particular location, hopefully that's -- I don't know what the contractor did, but let's be frank and know that contractors only want to make a profit. And where the generator goes is not of their concern.

But it is a concern to us. Because if we can't sleep every single night if that generator runs, that's giving someone an advantage that we do not have, even though the generator itself is placed underneath their bedroom window as well. But their major living spaces on the other side of the house are not impacted.

If in fact we have a power failure, I just have to say that our generator will go on on the other side of the house. And this

generator will go on on this side of the 1 2 house. And there won't be a single place in 3 this entire house where we would find refuge. And with that I thank you for listening. 4 5 And I hope that this will come to the idea that we will not have to hear the generator 6 7 and our life will not be disrupted in this 8 wonderful place that we've lived in for 26 9 years. Thank you so much. And please have a 10 good evening. And thank you again. And stay 11 healthy to everyone and a good holiday. 12 MRS. FRIEDMAN: Thank you very much. 13 MAYOR WEINBERG: Stay well. 14 1.5 MAYOR WEINBERG: Any other New Business? 16 There being none --17 TRUSTEE MONOSON: I'll -- I'll mention it 18 after, Denise. It's okay. 1 Weinberg. 2 MAYOR WEINBERG: Aye. 3 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There are five votes in favor, zero opposed. The 4 5 motion is adopted. * * * * * 6 7 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Your Honor, could 8 I ask for your indulgence for a moment. 9 MAYOR WEINBERG: Sure. 10 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I have a backyard 11 neighbor who has been growing bamboo. And as 12 long it stayed on his property he was 13 content. And no one else was bothered. 14 However, bamboo has a terrific ability to 1.5 spread. And in the course of spreading, it 16 has uprooted the rear fencing that I have 17 behind my garage. 18 Is there any code in the Village that 19 would specify what type of vegetation he can 20 and cannot have? And is bamboo a prohibitive vegetation that we should maybe look into? 21 2.2 MAYOR WEINBERG: I am not aware. Denise, is there one? I don't believe bamboo is 23

prohibited. Two, I don't --

24

VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: No, it's not.

1.5

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MAYOR WEINBERG: -- I don't believe there is a code provision that prohibits certain vegetation from being planted on private property, nor -- we can certainly check with the Village Attorney as well as with NYCOM.

It may not even be an area that the Village can regulate -- because it is private property -- in terms of what types of plantings can be -- can be made on -- in someone's backyard.

DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I have no problem with his planting on his property. But in as much as what he's done is encroached on my property and causing --

TRUSTEE PANG: I have the exact problem as well. Bamboo is very invasive. I have, you know, bamboo from next door coming to my yard. And it's very difficult to get it out.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Well, I'm happy to look into it. If it's something that can be regulated -- I certainly gave you my initial reaction.

DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Understood. 1 2 MAYOR WEINBERG: But what I will suggest. 3 -- and I'm happy to talk with you privately 4 about it. Have you had any discussions with 5 them? Because obviously it's a property damage issue. And it's one that whether they 6 7 like it or not, it's one that they should 8 resolve, whether it be themselves or through their insurance carrier. 9 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: One of my 10 11 neighbors did speak with them. And they sort 12 of took an attitude of laissez faire. I'm 13 not bothering you, so don't bother me. 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: Right. 1.5 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: But in reality he 16 is affecting our property. 17 MAYOR WEINBERG: No question. No 18 question. 19 I will look into the regulation aspect of 20 it, if that exists or it's a possibility. As 21 this is a private matter, since it's not 2.2 village business, we'll discuss it privately. 23 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Okay. I look 24 forward to that.

TRUSTEE PANG: I just want to give you 1 2 warning. My neighbor did try to hire someone 3 to take the bamboo out. And I think the contractor made some effort to take it out. 4 5 But six months, a year, boom. Bamboo is 6 coming up again. 7 MAYOR WEINBERG: Yeah. Yup. Yup. Your 8 advice is well taken. Unless it's entirely 9 eliminated it's extremely prolific. 10 TRUSTEE WESTON: You ought to hire a 11 panda. 12 MAYOR WEINBERG: That's right. All 13 right. I think that's the most -- there we 14 can have common grounds. I think we can all 1.5 agree on having a village panda. 16 TRUSTEE MONOSON: You get to name it. 17 18 TRUSTEE MONOSON: My brother-in-law 19 called me the other day. And I don't know if 20 other people on this side of the bridge have 21 experienced this, but he says that every 22 morning there are cars zipping around their 23 neighborhood blowing through stop signs from 24 Biener Audi.

They do test drives. And he has called 1 2 Biener and complained. And apparently 3 they've gotten many complaints. But I don't know if anybody else -- Ben, I don't know if 4 5 you notice it because they're around the corner from you. They go up Colonial. They 6 7 zip up Colonial and then they blow through 8 all the stop signs up there. 9 MAYOR WEINBERG: Jill, I'm sorry. Is it 10 a test drive, or are they just moving the 11 cars from the lot on East Shore? 12 TRUSTEE MONOSON: It's early in the 13 morning. And it's the ghost cars he said. 14 Like, they fix things and then they test run 1.5 them. It's not consumers test driving them. 16 It's the Audi people. MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Good. 17 18 TRUSTEE PANG: Yeah. I'm not an early 19 person, but I walk around my block pretty 20 much -- pretty often. I don't see them. But 21 then I --22 TRUSTEE MONOSON: He noticed it when he was walking to the train before the pandemic. 23 24 And now when he's walking his dog. He's just

told me that he's -- it's crazy. And he 1 2 called Biener. And they gave him, like, you 3 got to talk to this person. You got to talk to that person. And he got the feeling he 4 was not the first call there. 5 MAYOR WEINBERG: I'm sure he wasn't. 6 7 Could he jot down like -- as many instances 8 as he would like to jot down? Give me a 9 little log, and I will be happy to take it up 10 with Biener. 11 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Yeah. I know. I told 12 him that. And I told him that I would bring 13 it up at the meeting. 14 MAYOR WEINBERG: Any other New Business? 1.5 (None.) 16 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. 17 On the plus side with Biener they did 18 recently pay for the -- reimburse the village 19 for the attorney fees that were owed for the 20 incentive use permit as well as pay the fee 21 for the temporary signs that they put up 22 prior to the permanent signs. So we're always in continued discussions 23 24 with Biener for being in compliance with the

1	Village requirements as well as being a good
2	neighbor.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Steve, do we know
4	what their intentions might be with regard to
5	the spot where Ford has parked cars?
6	MAYOR WEINBERG: Right. Not yet. I was
7	told they would be getting back to us within
8	a couple of months on that. I was told that
9	just a couple of weeks ago.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: All right.
11	TRUSTEE WESTON: I apologize, but I'm
12	going to duck out.
13	MAYOR WEINBERG: Go ahead, Burton.
14	We have the vouchers and the adjournment.
